Goal 1: Provide for a Well-Maintained Town

1. Sustain relationships with State and Federal Agencies to ensure continued beach replenishment, maintenance and repair, and nourishment programs.		Continue participation in Association of Coastal Towns (ACT) and liaison with State Legislators. Fund and/or pursue grants and participate with other agencies to develop a regionally consistent, town-specific strategy and plan to address and mitigate the impact of Sea Level Rise (SLR), storm surge and nuisance flooding. As part of the SLR mitigation efforts, the Town should consider funding additional check valves in storm drains (connecting street drains to the canals) on the West side of Coastal Highway to prevent flooding during extreme high tide and major rain storm events. The Town has already funded some. Funding for additional recommended check valves should be included in the 10-year capital budget.

The Canal Water Quality Committee (CWQC) partnered with the Center of Inland Bays (CIB) in acquiring and installing floating wetlands and oyster cages to improve water quality. Early results are inconclusive. CWQC is also working with The Woods Hole Group to explore other potential options. CWQC is also working with DNREC on future dredging projects using grant funds obtained by the town. ACT liaison, consultant Tony Pratt, is researching the availability of grant funding from the ACOE and DNREC for a back-bay flooding study for the coastal towns partnering in ACT.	in the capital budget. 4. Continue efforts to improve common areas, including streets, wetlands and public open spaces.	The Community Enhancement Committee (CEC) sponsored the installation of a fitness area adjacent to the town hall and continues to sponsor the Adopt-a-Canal/Road End Program which enjoys great success. A pavement management study was initiated based on a 2016 consultant review of the town's road network. Treatments required to bring the network to a good state of repair would be approximately \$553,825. Approximately 9.77 miles of town maintained paved roads was surveyed. A preventive maintenance program utilizing microsurfacing will effectively extend pavement life by 8 to 10 years. Two phases were planned but only Phase I was completed. Phase II is on hold.	Investigate CP suggested wet areas for insect reduction. Implement the recent street maintenance study recommendations by the University of Delaware and begin preventative maintenance efforts. Consider improvements to the site drainage should also be considered to reduce insect breeding in the standing water. The town should also consider either funding or seeking grant funds together with DelDOT and performing the study and implementation of improvements to increase the performance of the forebay storm water treatment retention basin at Anchorage canal. The town is working with the Town of Fenwick Island in a multi-municipal effort to reduce costs with road work projects.

Activities include pot-luck dinners, July 4th events and other events throughout the year. SBCPRC also promotes family entertainment such as movies on the beach.

1. Provide daily 24-hour police protection and services.	Staffing shortage in 2018 has limited coverage to less than 24 hours resulting in no enforcement of the seasonal 3-hour turning prohibition at Kent Avenue /Black Gum Drive during July 2018. Scheduling modification made in August improved enforcement. Town Council has agreed on the number of police needed for 24X7 coverage and is working with the Chief of Police to fill positions.

2. Provide safe and improved access to and use of the beach.	The ad hoc Beach Access Improvement Committee was formed. Results were briefed to Town Council. The Police Department yearly promotes a safe biking outreach program and distributes free helmets and bike locks. The funds are provided through the Office of Highway Safety (OHS). The town works closely with Delmarva Power consultants to optimize town street lighting and efficiency. The town implemented new times and dates for Council sessions. The PC has updated existing by-laws regarding new membership. New parking pass procedures are being undertaken. The town continues to revise and implement new policies, procedures and guidelines for staff, management and committee activities. The Town Council continues to review ideas for improving or expanding town offices for security and expanding public use, as well as efforts to improve common areas, including streets, wetlands and public open spaces.	
2. Continue to pursue competitive pricing and sourcing for town utilities and other services, within regional constraints.	The town's goal is to continue to improve efficiency and effectiveness of services and continue to pursue competitive pricing and sourcing for utilities and other services within regional constraints. There is an on-going review of existing contracts and service options, for example, hired a new town attorney, hired a new beach concession service, and updated the town website through the State of Delaware web program to take advantage of the free service and support. The town council and town staff continue to plan and pursue implementation of 5G network services.	Continue to work on an ordinance to accommodate small cell installations.

Residents were asked to contact Verizon regarding old phone lines. Some were removed. Burying wires was considered but found to be not achievable due to cost and reliability issues. Continue to work on small cell tower ordinance to improve the appearance and continue to handle wire tails on electric poles and media installs.

The town continues to coordinate with the State of Delaware and other municipalities for any potential cooperative long-range community services plans, specifically back bay flooding, canal clean up and future nuisance flooding/storm water remedies.
